
What is an FSP

- Specifies legal requirements for forest practices specific to a forest tenure area
- ▶ Is required under the Forest and Range Practices Act
- Approved FSP is needed before permits for timber harvesting or road building can be issued
- Specifies results and strategies in relation to resource values/objectives set by government
- FSP is a high-level operational plan
- ► Term of 5 years
- Must be prepared and signed off by a Registered Professional Forester



Forest Development Unit

- ► A Forest Development Unit (FDU) is the geographic area to which the FSP applies and in which timber may be harvested/roads constructed
- A single FDU covers the entire Community Forest area
- Squamish FDU overlaps parts of two Landscape Units:
 - East Howe LU
 - Mamquam LU

Resource Values addressed in FSP

- Resource values to be addressed in FSPs include:
 - Soils
 - ▶ Timber
 - Wildlife/Wildlife Habitat
 - ► Water, Fish and Biodiversity within Riparian Areas
 - Water in Community Watersheds
 - Biodiversity Landscape and Stand level
 - Cultural Heritage Resources
 - Recreation
 - Visual Quality
- Objectives for each resource value are stated in the Forest Planning and Practices Regulation (FPPR) and/or in legal Orders

Results and Strategies

- An FSP must specify results or strategies to meet the government objectives for each resource value
- As defined in the *Forest Planning and Practices Regulation* (FPPR):
 - A Result is a "description of measurable or verifiable outcomes in respect of a particular established objected..."
 - ► A Strategy is "a description of measurable or verifiable steps or practices that will be carried out in respect of a particular established objective..."

Stocking Standards

- Stocking Standards define how harvested or disturbed areas will be reforested i.e. species and densities
- Stocking Standards are provided in the FSP for each Biogeoclimatic zone/subzone and Site Series combination found within the Community Forest
- The range of stocking standards include even aged standards, standards to address forest health issues, retention (multilayer) stocking standards and wildfire urban interphase areas (WUI) standards
- Consider current information on climate change for seed transfer
- Are assigned to each block at the site plan level

Site Level Planning

- At the operational/site level, Site Plans identify how the Results or Strategies from the FSP will be achieved at the site level
- Site Plans include a map of the proposed area showing all resources values present
- Identify the Ecological Classification of the proposed harvest area and assign a reforestation stocking standard
- Prescribe actions to manage the range of values consistent with the defined objectives for each
- Site Plans are prepared and signed off by a Registered Professional Forester

Upcoming changes to BC forestry legislation

- With the introduction of the Forest and Range Amendment Act (Bill 21, 2019) and Forest Statues Amendment Act (Bill 23, 2021), the Forest Stewardship Planning (FSP) framework will be, over time, progressively replaced by the Forest Landscape Planning (FLP) framework
- Forest Landscape Plans will replace the current Forest Stewardship Plans as part of changes to British Columbia's forest management system
